## Rescuing Food Before It's Wasted

It's horrifying to learn that 133 billion pounds of edible food — almost a third of this country's food — was thrown out in 2010, according to estimates by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Two Harry Chapin Food Bank partners, however, are working hard to save food that would wind up in the waste stream.

Through **Publix Super Markets'** "perishable recovery program," in partnership with Feeding America, the Food Bank picked up 2.84 million pounds of food in fiscal year 2013-2014. This represents fresh dairy, deli, produce and meat products that no longer met retail quality standards (and used to go into a Dumpster) but were still fine for human consumption.

"Feeding America told us that in May of this year, Publix exceeded the 100-million-pound mark for the first five years of

our partnership," said Publix spokesman Brian West. "We are very thankful for the work the Harry Chapin Food Bank does in the community to serve those in need."

**Walmart** also partners with Feeding America, and through its donation program gave more than 2 million pounds of food to the Food Bank last fiscal year. Every day, the Food Bank picks up "not saleable but still good to eat" fresh produce, meat, dairy and even cereal, explained Shelley Allman, Walmart Market Manager. Walmart also identifies food that will not sell before expiration date "to keep it out of the landfill and put it on someone's table," she added. "We're glad to work with the Food Bank to help our local community."

Thanks to the millions of pounds of food these two companies rescue, many families and seniors have food to eat.

## Help Brings Hope!

**Grace Place Naples client Deborah, 59:** "In different circumstances, I would go to the market and buy whatever I could fit in my car and distribute to families" in need. Now, the food she gets from this Food Bank partner agency allows her to stretch what she receives through the SNAP (food stamp) program. "I still cry every time I come here. It gives me a sense of hope."  
**St. Vincent de Paul client Lisa:** She and her husband work full-time jobs, but still struggle to provide food for their four children. "We make too much money to get help, but not enough to survive." Getting vegetables and meat from several area pantries is like "getting a treat" because "you can't afford to eat healthy when you have a limited budget."

## FOOD — The 'Fuel' That Improves Health

October is National Diabetes Month. This disease costs the U.S. \$117 billion annually, but eating fresh vegetables and fruits goes a long way to combat the disease and improve health! With more refrigeration capacity in our warehouses and trucks, the Food Bank is able to deliver more nutritional food to those in need. "Together we can help people eat better to feel better," said Anne Rose, vice president at Lee Memorial Health System.



A new refrigerated truck provided by a \$140,000 grant from the Walmart Foundation State Giving Program was unveiled during a mobile pantry distribution in Punta Gorda. There, more than 320 families received 17,340 pounds of fresh, nutritious food.

## 10 AmeriCorps Members To Serve in Collier and Lee

AmeriCorps has awarded funding to the Harry Chapin Food Bank — the only food bank in Florida to receive a grant — for 10 full-time member positions to serve in Collier and Lee counties. Called the SWFL Food Corps, they will focus on reducing food insecurity in both Collier and Lee counties and increasing volunteerism in Collier, and will be managed by Louise Bain, AmeriCorps Program Manager.

AmeriCorps members dedicate a year of their life to meeting critical community needs. Young people entering the workforce after their year of AmeriCorps service are much more likely to find a job in Florida.

## Morgan Stanley Commits Money and Volunteers

In a strong show of support, **Morgan Stanley** committed both money and volunteers to the Food Bank's mission to counter hunger in Southwest Florida.

As part of its Global Alliance for Children's Health, Morgan Stanley's national foundation presented the Food Bank with a \$25,000 grant to improve children's nutrition. The allocation recognized that its Fort Myers and Naples offices ranked among the top nationwide in community service hours. "There are so many barriers to a child becoming a healthy and productive adult," said Gregg Stupinski, Managing Director, Complex Manager. "We wanted to at least get one hurdle off the table."

In June, Morgan Stanley volunteers teamed up at two events. Ten volunteers packed 350 pounds of rice and 600 pounds of beans at the Food Bank's Fort Myers warehouse. A week later, 16 volunteers packed 7,000 pounds of potatoes at the Naples warehouse. Not only do these events give back to the community, he added, they build rapport among colleagues, give everyone a good feeling, and educate participants about the local need.

## McAlister Named 'Operations Leader'



Feeding America named **Neal McAlister**, the Harry Chapin Food Bank's Director of Operations, as Eastern Region Operations Leader of the Year! McAlister took on his role in 2008, just as the Food Bank moved into its 50,000-square-foot

facility and the recession hit. That year, he boosted distribution 82 percent to 8 million pounds. It hit 18.7 million pounds this past fiscal year, and his implementation of retail store pick-up and fresh produce programs accounted for 13 million pounds.
